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Minister

It was a notable year for Feilding, recognising 150 years of European settlement on the first weekend of March. We were part of a combined churches service in the Civic Centre, a big and successful gathering. Our own celebration was on King's Birthday weekend when we acknowledged 120 years in Feilding. Our Sunday service was

held in the hall, starting with morning tea, then worship and communion,

followed by lunch together. There were about 90 people, young and

old, with appropriate displays of memorabilia.

Planning for the upgrade of our toilets surely should not be the prevailing image of the year! But raising a significant amount was a highlight, as we reached the 'trigger point' number of \$140,000 in the middle of the year. We are very grateful for the generosity of people to God that has enabled this much needed revamp to continue gaining momentum. Tenders were subsequently called and confirmed in a church meeting before

Christmas. 2025 will be the year of demolition and reconstruction—only 13 years late.

It was sad to farewell Val Wilton (January) and Brian Philps (October). Brian had been associated with Feilding Baptist for most of his 96 years. It was also very sad and difficult to farewell Tim Wingate, one of our ICONZ

boys. We also acknowledge the passing of those linked to families in our congregation, such as Rose Berrington, Fiona Warring, and Grant White.



The transition of people in and out was regular throughout the year, with Willem and Dita returning to the Bay of Plenty, Keith Moore and his boys moving back to the U.S., and the Taylor family, after a huge contribution to worship and leadership, moving on in the middle of the year. The church directory was updated with 24 household changes, twelve added, twelve deleted.

While the worship team looked very thin for a couple of weeks, with a



very heavy load on Elisabeth Hince and Sharon Douglas, suddenly new people emerged, a flautist, a drummer. new singers, leaders! We are sincerely grateful to God and look forward to how this will develop in 2025.

Andrew and Hazel Robertson's move to Foxton meant they were less able to attend to security breaches in the middle of the night.

Hazel concluded her role in the kitchen. did as Andrew with his hospitality role. Reon and Elisabeth Hince's move to Bainesse has considerably

increased their travel time, limiting what they like to contribute to.

Creative prayer has again been a highlight, with the year getting off to a very positive start. Inspiration from the 24/7 prayer book *Red* Moon Rising, led to the creation of a 27 hour prayer event from Wednesday 24th to Thursday 25th January. Thirty people took part in the four 'stations': a prayer and pin, where each person in the church directory was prayed for; a kneeling space with the Lord's Prayer from the KJV, NIV, and The Message; a communion space; and a listening

space to record what people were hearing from God. One reflection was written at 3 a.m. about an earthquake, and suddenly, there was one, a decent shake occurred at 3:18a.m!

Our weekly prayer time, which has had various hosts over the last nine vears, moved back to the church on Mondays at 5:15pm. We continued host a combined churches

where Conlon contributed with worship each night. also hosted Jules November, with an audience of 40.

Preaching this year has been fun, starting with four of the Minor Prophets in January; Nahum. Hosea, Obadiah, and Zephaniah. This was far richer and enjoyable than I had expected, and a surprisingly positive way to begin the year. We continued with Acts and, later in the year, 1 John, a book with which I was not familiar. Heather Relf's morning tea scones were memorable and always appreciated.

We engaged with ten 'guest' preachers who provided excellent



variety and difference. We should mention that Pam Barnett, who has been a much valued backup preacher over the last few years, developed terminal cancer this year. We miss her involvement.

Kruif and Rochie Torres brought Alina to be dedicated and turned up again the following week! Alina was delightful, and people were very welcoming to them afterwards. Diane Botha's calligraphy made for a very professional certificate.

We have continued our involvement at Coombrae Rest Home, preparing and leading a service on the third Thursday of each month. This has been well supported by our musicians Gillian Drayton and Esmé Haigh, along with singers, for which I am grateful. We can have over 20 residents, which shows the value to them of what we're doing. It's great to bring a Baptist flavour for Dennis Wickham and Elaine Telford.

Our ICONZ and Girls' Brigade groups have functioned very well and even included a rare Girls' Brigade church parade and service. Tanya Carter has been an excellent leader of our preschool group, Cuppa Chat and Play, on Mondays before concluding in October.

To round out the year, we switched missions from Christian Blind Mission (CBM) to Mission Aviation Fellowship (MAF) for our Christmas appeal. CBM has held an Advent appeal over the last few years, but this didn't happen in 2024. MAF responded enthusiastically to our suggestion of sponsoring some of the Bibles they sell in Papua New Guinea. Our givers responded generously with \$850, including the Christmas Day offering.

Finally, I am very grateful for all the people who serve, and who use their gifts in a great range of ways. So much is given to God through our church. It's not just at working bees that people contribute their time and energy, it's also through skills, leadership, and many other ways. Thank you.

I am also very thankful to those on prayer who team have continued to lift people and situations to God. You are a blessing to us all. Thank you to Elisabeth Hince who has coordinated this.

This year, our group included home-based several early childhood who caregivers along 2-4 brought children each—many of them very young!


Unfortunately, in Term couldn't keep Mondays free anymore, but I discovered that at two of the primary schools where I work, there were two lovely kids who had left our group to start






Girls' Brigade

ICONZ

Feilding ICONZ runs during school term time on Wednesdays, 6–7:30 p.m. This year, with the addition of new leaders, we added a third group, so we now take young men starting from age five (previously eight) through to 18 years of age. Many of the boys have gone on to become exceptional leaders.

Think of ICONZ as a mix between Scouts and a Christian youth group. The guys work to earn badges while at the



same time developing a practical appreciation of what God has done for us. The badges cover spiritual, action, community, and interest themes. Summed up, ICONZ is faith, blood, mud, fire, water, speed, smash, and build. ICONZ, started in 2003, is the NZ rebranded version of Boys' Brigade. Our aim is to inspire the lads to develop discipline,

integrity, respect, and tenacity and become real Kiwi icons (ICONZ).

Some of the activities we did this year included: bush survival skills, bushcraft, marching in the ANZAC dawn parade, lots of sports, memorising the Lord's Prayer, boys delivering devotions, looking at global missionary work, gaining

essential first aid skills, science experiments, hiking, a target shooting competition, Minecraft, knot tying and rope skills, and cooking.

It has been helpful to reflect on our contribution to mission initiatives over the year. Each week, we collect items for the Salvation Army foodbank. At the end of the year, with our Christmas Giving Tree, we collect for the Manchester House foodbank.

We have made donations throughout the year to Hospital Chaplaincy, Eden Christian Kindy, Grapevine Magazine, Word for Today (Radio Rhema), and contributed to the cost of 1,200 pieces of shortbread given by the Feilding churches to spectators at the Christmas parade.

Our 2023 surplus was tithed to support Bridget Ingham, who serves with Mission Aviation Fellowship (MAF) in Papua New Guinea. We have been part of the support team for Jess, Benji, and Elliott Hunt, who serve in the same place. With their return in 2025, we would like to propose that this support switch to

Bridget. Her regular newsletters have been much appreciated.

Our Christmas offering raised \$850 to subsidise PNG language Bibles sold by MAF staff.

Prayer and Self Denial is now called Renew Together, and this provided a window into what our Baptist Arotahi team is doing. A large offering was sent following this appeal. We also receive news electronically each week from Arotahi in the form of a Prayer Calendar. Eight of these are printed for those without electronic access. ensuring prayer happens from Feilding. The two couples we support are serving in India.

Admin & Maintenance Team

As has been mentioned above. the toilet upgrade (or LUpgrade) has been at the forefront of our minds all year. Tenders closed for this on Tuesday, 10th December. This resulted in a church meeting on Monday, 16th December, to Design confirm Builders Feilding the successful as tenderer. anticipated They

starting on the 27th of January, assuming the awarding of Building Consent.

Lyndon Ingram has

led this work, with Colin Funnell and Michael Taylor as part of the team.

When it comes to maintaining our facilities, 2024 has been a notable year. Firstly, some unexplained damage occurred to one of the oven doors. This was irreparable. So, rather than have mismatched ovens, we took the opportunity, after much

consultation, to purchase two new Westinghouse ovens. Those who use them provided a useful list of requirements, and the positive feedback since they arrived has been pleasing. A purpose built rangehood is being prepared and will be installed as part of the toilet upgrade.

Also in the kitchen, a surprising

breakdown in the continuous Rheem hot water unit resulted in its replacement in November. The opportunity was taken

to upsize this after we briefly ran out of hot water at Brian Philps' funeral.

Another breakdown was one of the auditorium speakers. After consultation with the experts, we were given three options, ranging from \$5,000 to \$12,000. Unfortunately, the dearer option meant a much better sound coverage for the shape of the



room, so that has been ordered. \$2,000 towards this was still in the kitty from the worship upgrade a few years ago, so very helpful.

At the December church meeting, it was raised that the rear wall tilt panels were leaking. It was agreed to seek expert advice regarding this. We are expecting a solution to be provided in 2025.

Over the last couple of years, we have greatly appreciated the use

of six large round tables from The Salvation Army. These have improved fellowship at our

church lunches and have also been a bonus for those who use our buildings. We offered to purchase these, and a deal was reached. They are now ours.

Outside our building, a significant two-year upgrade of the neighbouring library was completed, including landscaping. For our benefit, the garden nearest our entrance was replaced as well. At the back of

building, huge two eucalyptus trees taken were down for the creation of 49 car parks. This has had a surprising effect. much less weekly sweeping of our front path is needed now. Martin Dodge and Andrew Philps also cleaned bucketfuls of gum leaves out of the spouting, for what should be the last time! We are grateful for the increased and handy parking options to come.

We have again become compliant with upgraded Fire and Emergency procedures, with FENZ approving our scheme. A lot of work, but totally essential to prepare for

an emergency. For the second year in a row, we had money in the budget for the replacement of the exit lights. But, thankfully, they again passed the winter check, so that pain is still to come.

Finally, thank you to Brenda and James Woodfield for cleaning the buildings each week, and to Eric Relf, who sorts, fixes, and keeps the building looking tidy.

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





